- 1. Highlighting our Collaborators: <u>Elisabeth Cianciola</u>, Aquatic Mitigation Specialist, MA Department of Fish and Game discussing a funding opportunity in the Blackstone Watershed for wetland and waterway restoration
 - <u>https://www.mass.gov/in-lieu-fee-program</u>
 - MA DFG In-Lieu Fee Program (ILFP) allows payment instead of on-site mitigation of project impacts (determined by Army Corps)
 - Both preservation and restoration projects are eligible (restoration scores more highly)
 - ILFP subject to multiplier ratios: projects must have a greater positive benefit than the area being impacted
 - Projects may be conducted in the site's service area (MA has 4) the entire Blackstone is in Central MA region
 - CBO roles: share watershed plans/priorities, inform stakeholders of funding opportunities, apply to sponsor a project
 - Project examples: removing stream barriers (e.g. dams, culverts), floodplain revegetation, land restoration (note: conservation requires aquatic resource *on* the property & should be high quality & high threat)
 - Ineligible projects: feasibility or monitoring studies, educational programs, long-term water control structures, invasive species control (but these may be components of a larger eligible project)
 - More projects in Eastern MA. Burnshirt River Watershed Preservation project in Barre, MA located in Blackstone watershed
 - Phyllis Manchaug Pond Certified CWF in Sutton restoration project? Or culvert replacement project and land conservation abutting existing conserved area with CWF resources.
 - Available: \$200k for wetland & \$70k for stream projects (can be combined) no match required
 - Application requirements: Project manager, description, location, budget, types of resources improved by project (classify and quantify wetlands/streams and buffer areas), permits (if restoration)
 - Project requirements: public notice (to inform agencies), documentation of site protection, project plan including long-term management, annual progress report during implementation
 - Can be used for community's first right of refusal for permanent protection of Ch61 land
- 2. Special Topic Addressing the ongoing sewer discharge from the Woonsocket Wastewater Treatment Plant (see EcoRI news story here),

- Updates from Joe Haberek, RI Department of Environmental Management
 - A no-contact advisory was issued in response to 6/5/22 notification of unpermitted discharge from Woonsocket Regional Wastewater Treatment Facility, stemming from a buildup of solids. Partially treated sewage in the 6 million gallons per day outflow from the plant.
 - A previous no-contact advisory was issued 3/23-25/22 for a similar situation at plant of solids



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- November noncompliance letter addressed effluent (nutrient) violations, not a bacterial issue (didn't close river)
- Jacobs operates the plant, Synagro operates a sewage sludge incinerator located at plant serving the region. Plant was instructed to increase bacterial testing and upstream/downstream monitoring
- o Plant installed 2 additional filter presses to address the solids this week (a temporary solution)
- RIDEM is currently evaluating the advisory, which could be lifted if solids and effluent issues are resolved. The effluent has been meeting limits since Friday, 6/10 and no-contact advisory was lifted on 6/17 after the meeting
- Fecal coliform data are collected daily and is publicly available, but isn't easily shared currently received via informal email. For info on this data, reach out to Joe.
- Sludge not currently tested for PFAS (ME doesn't allow land-applied sludge; RI does not land-apply)
- Penalties or fines have not been assessed for these events.
- The permit for this site is up for renewal as of 12/31/22. However, NPDES permits remain in effect if a complete permit is submitted
- There is a 30 day comment period and public hearing, if requested, though the permit is not anticipated to be drafted until end of 2023 or early 2024 due to limited capacity and lag time in permit issuance.
- This is an environmental justice issue given its disproportionate impacts on the populations of Woonsocket, Central Falls, and Pawtucket.

- Questions/Discussion
 - Is the city applying for BIL/ARPA funds to upgrade this facility?
 - A question for the City, but they are looking at funding
 - Note: Woonsocket City Council meeting on Monday, 6/20
 - We've had to cancel events, such as Connecting with Canoes, ZAP50th, water chestnut pull, etc. And in the 50th anniversary of ZAP and CWA, it's very frustrating and unacceptable.
- Actions
 - The Collaborative drafted and sent a letter addressed to RIDEM concerning the situation
 - This event could be leveraged as an opportunity to engage with regulation development for the Sewage Notification bill (advocated for by Mass Rivers)- connect with Save the Bay
 - o This could be leveraged as a way to advocate for greater investment in public infrastructure
 - Rep. Mary Keefe interested in working with representatives in Rhode Island, such as Committee on Environment
 - This news should be shared with local schools, community organizations, summer camps, best through direct outreach

 Nonprofits are not eligible for the Dept. of Interior funding, which would best align with the Collaborative's goals.

• MA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

- Statement of Interest deadline: Rolling, but recommended by 6/28/2022 (Note: Sub-application final <u>State</u> is 10/09/2022)
- Activities can include but are not limited to: stormwater drainage and culvert improvements; floodplain and stream restoration; flood control, diversion, and storage; property acquisition; slope stabilization; infrastructure protection; aquifer storage; seismic and wind retrofits; structure elevations; resilient infrastructure projects
 - Must fill out and submit a completed Statement of Interest about project to determine basic eligibility. *Construction Projects Form:* <u>https://www.mass.gov/forms/fy-2021-mitigation-</u> <u>statement-of-interest-for-construction-projects</u> *C&CB/Planning/Advance Assistance Form:* <u>https://www.mass.gov/forms/fy-2021-mitigation-statement-of-interest-for-</u> <u>ccbplanningadvance-assistance</u>
 - Note: requires use of benefit-cost analysis (BCA), but support provided on first-come first-served basis from MEMA
