#### **Presentations:**

<u>John Rogan</u>, from the HERO Program at Clark University will speak about the latest findings from their summer research around tree stewardship in Worcester, MA!

- Research on examining urban tree plantings to mitigate UHI and increase resilience
- Research approach: what works and doesn't work with tree plantings
  - o Biophysical: GIS, tree inventory, tree health
  - Socio-political/ placemaking: interviews, motivations of residents, which trees residents want
- MA Greening the Gateway Cities Program: DCR plants trees post ALB outbreak
- After the ALB outbreak and tree removal, citizens noticed increased temperatures, higher electricity bills, decreased aesthetics
- Measuring Tree Survivorship:
  - o Drop in survivorship in Worcester between the two inventories performed
  - Average survivorship between 70-90%
  - o Identified the species with the best survivorship
  - Negative factors: having over 6 trees in a parcel, trees planted in a backyard, if the ownership of the parcel changes, plantings in maintained parks, incompatible species types
  - o Positive factors: native species, single family homes, presence of HOAs, front yard plantings, street trees
- Cooling and Energy Savings:
  - 20,000-30,000 trees were planted post ALB in the Burncoat neighborhood, providing significant cooling that has increased overtime as the trees grow
  - 10% canopy / acre yields 1°F decrease
  - Planting 3 or more trees per acre yields the best cooling rate
  - 40% white roof per acre yields 1°F decrease (4x more than trees)
  - Ecosystem services: energy savings increase by 100% every decade
- Resident Perceptions:
  - o Benefits of having trees: share, aesthetics, wildlife, privacy, energy, etc.
  - Drawbacks of having trees: leaves/ cleanup, hazard/damage, wildlife, maintenance etc.
  - Mixed feelings from residents about neighborhood recovery and ALB outbreak tactics

### Legislative/Policy Updates:

- **The Biden Administration** released the third annual progress report on its America the Beautiful Initiative. Read a blogpost about it <u>here</u> or read the full report <u>here</u>.
- The U.S. Department of Transportation <u>announced more than \$110 million</u> in federal funding as part of its new Wildlife Crossings Pilot Program in December.
- The Healy Driscoll Administration:
  - o Released the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs (EEA) <u>inaugural report</u> highlighting key milestones and accomplishments by the agency in Governor Maura Healey's first year. This report showcases the outstanding work done by EEA organizations and partners to ensure that Massachusetts climate goals are achieved. The report describes the EEA officials' visits across the state and actions to identify and address climate-related goals, including but not limited to decarbonization, climate resilience, natural resource stewardship, and environmental and energy justice.
  - Released a <u>Climate Report Card</u> to evaluate progress on reducing greenhouse gas emissions and protecting communities from the impacts of climate change. The report card offers assessments of the state's environmental justice, transportation, buildings, power, natural and working lands, and climate resilience efforts. Overall, Massachusetts has made significant progress and is well positioned for 2025, but a strong policy response to existing and emerging challenges will be needed to meet the state's ambitious 2030 targets.
  - O Announced \$50 Million Investment and Milestones for Forests as Climate Solutions Initiative. The Climate Forestry Committee's report contains recommendations to the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs (EEA) regarding enhanced climate-oriented forest management practices for Massachusetts based on the latest climate science. The 12-member Committee of scientific experts emphasized the importance of keeping forests intact by enlarging forest reserves, increasing permanent conservation efforts, and reducing the conversion of forests to other uses. Noting the critical role forests play in mitigating dangerous climate change, the Committee urged the state to sharpen its land management focus on climate change mitigation and adaptation. EEA is allocating \$50 million to helping communities conserve forested land, as well as supporting forest-based businesses and local economies. EEA will invest this funding in forest conservation, including new forest reserves, and incentives that encourage municipal and private landowners to adopt climate-oriented management approaches. This funding will help the state reach its climate goals, as set forth in the Clean Energy and Climate Plan, conserving 40 percent of Massachusetts' natural and working lands by 2050.

   Builds on MVP 1.0 to support communities with new processes, tools, and resources. The planning process will revisit MVP 1.0 priorities with enhanced involvement of the wider community to carry out equitable climate resilience work. It includes guaranteed funding to implement a seed project. No match requirement, joint municipal applications encouraged.
- (Anticipated May June 2024) <u>EEA Planning Assistance Grants</u> Support efforts to plan, zone, develop, and conserve land in ways consistent with the Massachusetts Sustainable Development Principles. Priorities include zoning for sustainable housing production, mitigation of climate change through zoning and other regulations, and zoning that advances permanent land conservation.
